"PROBLEMS AT THE MANSE"



In September 2015 we had to have inspections carried out at the manse to comply with insurance requirements. You can imagine the shock and horror when the finance and property committee were advised that the manse was "dangerous". Panic ensued after the September finance and property meeting but thankfully the

panic was curtailed and the manse family did not have to evacuate 10 Edgcumbe View.

To put the above into context, the wiring in the garage was in a dangerous condition and the work to rectify this was completed in December. However, the manse needs to be rewired, a pretty horrendous job as it is an extremely disruptive procedure with walls having to be tracked – dust everywhere! In an effort to keep disruption for Robin, Deryn and family to a minimum, the work is to be carried out in the 5 weeks they are on holiday in South Africa visiting Deryn's family.

The manse will have to be completely cleared of furniture, all carpets lifted etc – then the "dust storm" can begin. While the manse is stripped, the heating system is going to be updated, double glazing replaced (many of the existing units have broken seals) and new double glazed front and rear doors fitted. When this work is completed, every room will have to be redecorated and the carpets re-laid.

Hopefully everything will run smoothly and when the Waugh's return all furniture will be back in situ and normal service will resume.


Sharing God's Gifts

SYDENHAM WORK OF GOD REPORT

BELFAST SYNOD - MARCH 2016

Sydenham continues to be a vibrant congregation with a diverse age range.

There is still a good number attending Sunday morning and evening worship. At Morning Worship, the music is led by our praise group of which there are many people with different musical gifts. Evening Worship follows a more traditional style. We are blessed to have several Local Preachers who all exercise a good pulpit ministry.

Young people and children are well catered for, and are discipled by our fantastic team of volunteers and paid staff. The Scout troop numbers 50+ boys; and the Girls' Brigade 70+ girls. There are various fellowship/discipleship groups for the young people during the week. Our Sunday School (called KidZone) and Bible Class (called Focus) are well attended with good leadership. Although we have excellent leadership we are always in need of more leaders.

Sydenham is an outward-looking congregation, seeking to explore new and fresh ways of engaging with our community. One such ministry called 'Coffee Kindness' has been going for a few years, where church members give out free cups of hot tea and coffee at the local railway station. As the name suggests we simply seek to show kindness (and if you want to use a theological term, 'grace') to those who commute using rail travel. We have also held a 'Meet the Neighbours' BBQ in an endeavour to build open relationships with our neighbours - free burgers go down well in Sydenham! Some of the women enjoy their 'Community Prayer Walks' where they simply walk around the neighbourhood, praying for those who live locally. Whenever the opportunity arises, they engage in gentle conversation about what they are doing and invite topics for prayer. Our Prayer Network was set up over 25 years ago, and now alongside this we are launching a Prayer Texting Network as this is the preferred mode of communication for many people these days.

Our discipleship follows a dual approach where we hold a traditional Bible study which is a lecture style teaching evening; and also some small groups called 'Life Together Groups'. In total we have about 50 people engaged in some form of discipleship programme. It is interesting to note that the older generation prefers the more traditional teaching Bible Study, whilst the young generations prefer the small groups with discussion and prayer.

In conclusion, Sydenham is in good spiritual health because it's focus is on missional discipleship.

World Church Secretary

Hi, my name is Alan Hall. I think my official job title is World Church Secretary. My job is to encourage interest in and prayerful and financial support for the overseas aspects of the work of the Methodist Church in Ireland.

There are 2 elements to this work.

1) MMS (1) - Methodist Missionary Society (Ireland)

MMS supports Mission Partners from Ireland working overseas, for example the Sloan family in Germany. It also organizes the Container Ministry that recently celebrated 25 years of ministry.

In Sydenham, we usually

have a morning service in February that seeks to promote and celebrate the work of MMS (I). At the service, the MMS (I) annual reports are circulated with envelopes. There are also MMS envelopes included in the FWO pack and collecting boxes are used to support the work.

Changes in Kiwoko Hospital, Uganda




Ugandan parliamentary and presidential elections have been and gone. Thankfully they passed off relatively peacefully as many in the country were concerned that major

unrest was a possibility. The president has been returned for another term. Most of the local people voted for him - they do not want change!

Few of us really enjoy change, yet Kiwoko is changing all the time. Regular visitors are amazed to find new buildings; a new pick-up; new nurses; a new midwifery course..... and yet at the root of the work of Kiwoko hasn't changed in over 25 years, still providing holistic health care to the poor and vulnerable by being Christ-centred in all they do. This year they will celebrate 25 years since the official opening of

Kiwoko Hospital in 1991. The book 'The Man with the Key has gone' by Dr Ian Clarke is a great read on how the hospital started.

Last year the hospital vehicles cost a lot of money as they were old and in constant



vehicle replaced before too long to reduce the significant maintenance costs needed to keep the old vehicles on the road in recent years.

The new Maternity unit was built 6 years ago. There is a noticeable increase in the number of mothers coming through with around 3300 babies delivered in 2015 this is double the number when the unit opened and is a result of the antenatal care in the community when mothers are encouraged to give birth in the safer environment of the hospital. January was unusually wet resulting in a big rise in the number of cases of malaria and this affected the whole hospital. It is a serious problem in pregnancy and affects mothers and babies alike. Treatment needs to be prompt and effective. Thankfully no mothers died from malaria last year.

In mid February, the Kiwoko community held a Prayer March. 250 people turned out, with temperatures well into the 30's, to walk a route around Kiwoko village that would take just under 2 hrs. Armed with water, umbrella's (to keep the sun off), sun cream for some, young and old, gathered behind a truck containing prayer & praise leaders under Sister Sara's guidance. Heartfelt prayers were offered for schools, churches, police force, courts, local government, businesses and families. They declared the authority and sovereignty of God in Kiwoko, coming against the many witchcraft practices and claiming the town for the Lord. The walk finished at the taxi-park in the town centre with a gospel message and several people gave their lives to Christ! People from Pentecostal and Anglican backgrounds marched and interceded as a united body for their community! We have since heard that more new believers are turning up at Churches as a result of the march.

Points for Prayer requested by hospital staff

- *Praise God for starting and sustaining the work in Kiwoko for what it is today. While many hospitals in rural Uganda struggle to survive, over a hundred thousand patients are touched by our care every year.
- * The pound sterling has recently weakened significantly against the Ugandan Shilling meaning that our income has reduced. Pray for the finance team trying to balance the books and for fresh donors to help us plug the gaps. (The hospital receives 3% of its income from the government and relies on 58% from overseas donors to keep functioning.)
- *Several junior doctors and nurses are planning to go for further studies in the coming months. Pray as they undergo interviews that they will find a suitable place to study and that good replacement staff are recruited when they leave.

Together, 'We treat, Jesus heals'.

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STOREHOUSE

September 2015 saw Sydenham Methodist begin its 3^{rd} year partnership with Storehouse.

That time has flown, but what is most impressive is the continuous commitment and dedication of our congregation and friends in the donations they have made. Each fortnight we have consistently delivered a full trolley of donated food – that is over 70 trolleys full of food during our partnership to date!

This year saw Storehouse develop a quarterly newsletter to keep supporters updated of their work, which many of our congregation have enjoyed reading.

In December 2015, our congregation was set a specific challenge – to gather and donate 179 boxes of stuffing, which would then be used to make up Christmas



hampers for the families known to Storehouse – to ensure



that on the day in which we celebrate Jesus' birth, these families could experience a very real sense of His love. Well, to quote one member of our congregation "we stuffed it", we met our target and beyond and on 14th December, with the assistance of a little helper, we delivered 183 boxes of stuffing to the warehouse. On top of this, our

generous congregation also donated enough funds to purchase 36 turkeys for these families. Alongside our donations, Sydenham Methodist has made specific referrals to Storehouse, which has seen individuals and families benefit directly from our partnership, providing them with a sense of God's love and goodness at a time in their lives when it was much needed.

Storehouse itself has faced a 'season of change', which has seen them having to relocate their city centre base from Castle Arcade to Queen Street (temporarily) whilst they continue to search for a more permanent location, however what has not changed is their purpose.

Storehouse continues to demonstrate God's unconditional love and mercy in a practical way, to people in need across the whole of Belfast, through providing food, furniture, clothing and face to face contact. They provide individuals and families with choice and dignity on a daily basis.

We look forward to continuing to work in partnership with Storehouse to support the growth and development of the organisation as they serve individuals and families throughout our city. Support can be given through continuing to donate to our food collection, through continuing to pray for the organisation and its service users, and through making the work of storehouse known throughout our community. Storehouse also provides many other volunteering opportunities in a variety of areas – from clothes sorting, delivery drivers and hospitality.

Thank-you for the support that has been given so far, and please join us as we continue to serve through the work of Storehouse.

A Lesson from the Geese

 As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an 'uplift' for the other bird following. By flying in a V formation, the whole flock adds 71 % flying range than if a bird flew alone.

Lesson: People, who share a common direction and sense of community, can get where they are going quicker and easier when they are travelling on the thrust of one another.

2. Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone, and quickly gets back in formation to take advantage of the 'lifting power' of the bird immediately in front.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed where we want to go.

3. When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies at the point position.

Lesson: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership – interdependent on each other.

4. The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

Lesson: We need to ensure our honking from behind is encouraging, not something less helpful.

5. When a goose gets sick or wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow him down to see if they can help and protect him. They will either stay with him until he is either able to fly again or dies. Then they launch out on their own with another formation or to catch up with the flock.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as the geese, we'll stand by each other like that.

The aim of this lesson was to help us understand why we should trust in God. To know that His plans for us are good, that He uses people from many backgrounds. Focus

followed by a speaker. Last year continued our current trend of running Focus during the summer (imaginatively entitled 'Summer Focus'!), which provided an incentive for our young people to attend church during the summer months. We learnt about Adam and Eve and how we should follow Gods rules as well as our parents, carers and teachers.


